AGGRESSIVE SPAY/NEUTER EFFORTS LAUNCHED

2010 saw record breaking intake numbers for the WCSPCA with 3,318 animals coming into our care. We knew we had to adjust our community services and focus on a lasting solution. Our spay-neuter programs had long been in existence but were not running at a high enough volume to make a measurable impact. Through our existing Green Country SpayNeuter Assistance Program (GCSNAP), the WCSPCA began monthly

low income spay/neuter clinics. These clinics offer free and low cost spay/neuter surgeries for the pets of qualifying Washington County residents. A big thanks to Dr. Scott Cochran for providing the seed money for these clinics. To date in 2011, over **1,000** surgeries have been performed.



2011 BRINGS RECORD BREAKING GRANTS

Thanks to the hard work of the Washington County SPCA President Dawnette Brady, in 2011 the WCSPCA was awarded the largest two grants ever bestowed upon the organization.

In January, a \$33,336.07 Shelter Improvement Grant was awarded. That new record was far exceeded in September, when a \$52,000 Spay/Neuter Grant was received. Both grants were graciously awarded by PetSmart Charities. Dawnette, who is currently the President of the Board of Directors for the shelter, worked long and hard to jump through all the hoops that were needed in order to qualify for these much-needed grants.

The first PetSmart Charities grant funded a great many 'shelter improvement' projects that had been needed for quite some time. It funded a new interior for the trailer housing the Kitten Nursery. The trailer floor and walls were heavily damaged in the 2007 flood. The subfloor was rotted and the surfaces were difficult to sanitize and maintain. The entire trailer was overhauled with everything from a new subfloor, commercial flooring, FRP panel walls and new stainless steel kitty condos. Inside those nifty kitty condos is shelving for lounging and a separate area for stainless litter pans. These new litter pans will be gladly welcomed by anyone who has ever dealt with the cardboard ones that were in use. The makeover will improve the lives of the animals that are currently housed at the shelter, as well as make daily cleaning easier for the workers who have been in the trenches every day dealing with all the issues that come with having a shelter in need of so many repairs and improvements.

Anyone who has spent any amount of time in the dog run area of the adoption building knows that it

is a high stress environment. Imagine being lost and missing your family while being placed in an area with so many other strange dogs. Some might be bigger than you and intimidating, or you might feel as if they are threatening your food and water. To make the levels of stress worse, every time a human or animal enters the building, the sound of dogs barking is deafening. It would be scary for any dog, especially one stressed from being on a long walkabout with little food or water for days.

Now, thanks to the PetSmart Charities grant, this stress is going to be significantly lessened. Panels are slated to be installed in all the dog runs of the adoption building replacing the chain link that has been in service for so many years. According to Dawnette, this provides two benefits, "the animals are less stressed if they cannot see all of the dogs down the run of the building, and most importantly it provides a shield so that there is no nose-to-nose contact of the dogs. While nose-to-nose contact isn't a concern with healthy dogs, all it takes is one sick dog and disease can spread like wildfire."

The panels have been ordered in the blue and orange colors of the shelter logo and will be easily transferable to the new shelter when it is built. In addition to the new panels providing for more comfortable surroundings, comfy Kuranda dog beds are being added to every dog kennel in the shelter. They provide a dry, sanitary place for the dogs to rest – up off the concrete floors.

The second grant received by PetSmart Charities is really a groundbreaking grant because of the mix of things it will be used to fund. Usually most grants do not cover advertising, but thanks to the persistence of Ms. Brady in working with PetSmart, they agreed to allow a substantial portion of the grant to be spent on a campaign to raise awareness. This means that every month for one-year, the WCSPCA will be spaying/neutering 100 Bartlesville residents' pets. The intent is to prevent the birth of countless unwanted dogs/cats. The marketing mix funded by

CONTRACTUALLY SPEAKING

New City Contracts with Bartlesville, Ochelata and Copan point to a solution oriented relationship with the Washington County SPCA.

It takes a village to take care of critters--and a whole lot of people willing to roll up their sleeves and get to work to make it a reality. As of July 2011, the Washington County SPCA and the Cities of Bartlesville, Ochelata, and Copan have worked to form a contract outlining specific duties and responsibilities of both the Cities and the WCSPCA. In short, they will work together to better assure the welfare of abandoned, lost, stray and injured dogs and cats found and brought in by not only Animal Control officials but city residents as well. This encourages citizens to take an active role in caring for animals and not having an "it's Animal Control's job and not mine" attitude. It assures that--in the event that Animal Control officials are already busy or swamped--individuals can bring the stray animals in for care.

Do you ever wonder just what it is that the WCSPCA does? Just what does it take to run a responsible, qualified shelter? Sadly, we see all too often what happens to animals who escape from their owners or that were never wanted in the first place.

Each City is responsible for apprehending any dog or cat running at large within its' city limits and is then charged with insuring that all animals seized by its agents are delivered promptly to the WCSPCA to be impounded as "City Animals" under the control and custody of the WCSPCA.

If a lost pet is reclaimed by its owner and is not spayed/neutered, an intact permit must be purchased. Alternatively, spay/neuter surgery can be scheduled - but the animal must remain in care of the WCSPCA until it is delivered to the veterinarian for the surgery. The WCSPCA is allowed to retain the fees for intact permits but makes it a goal to never issue one. It is a heartfelt and ongoing objective of the WCSPCA to encourage pet owners of intact animals to spay/neuter their pets. *Over population of animals is the number one cause of over-crowded shelters.* It costs big bucks to shelter litters of unwanted animals.

Educating people and raising the consciousness of the public is an important job of the WSPCA. One way of doing this (and at no cost to the tax payers!) is, the Cities will now display posters, fliers and other informational materials in City buildings advertising the spay/neuter programs provided by the WCSPCA and provide a link on the Cities' websites to the WCSPA's **Found** page. The Found Page is a new feature on their website.

Just as important as photos of the shelter's adoptable animals, now there are photos of pets that have been found and were fortunate to be brought to the shelter before meeting a tragic end. This addition to the website hopes to reunite people with their lost furry four-legged friends.

Cities and the WCSPCA issue animal licenses. It's not a "tax," it's more of a declaration of responsibility. We license our cars; why not our pets? When the WCSPCA issues a license, they keep

\$2.50 for each one issued to cover administrative costs.

No adoptable animal has been euthanized by the WCSPCA since September 2009. This could not happen without the dedication of the many volunteers in our community who work hand in hand with the WCSPCA to protect the many dogs and cats who, through no fault of their own, would be left fragile, forgotten and forlorn. They help with many tasks including working at the shelter cleaning kennels and crates, walking/feeding/watering animals, doing paper work, assisting with long hours of spay/neuter clinics.

No animal is available for adoption from our facility without first being spayed or neutered. We practice what we preach.

Yes, it takes a village--and whole lot of money and lo♥e.

the grant is intended to significantly raise awareness that a solution to pet overpopulation is within reach to everyone in the community. Research shows that educating the general public about the importance of spay/neuter – along with providing the service to those who otherwise wouldn't be able to afford the surgeries – will begin to have a major impact on the overpopulation problem. It is a goal of the Board of Directors and the shelter staff to focus on the problem not just try to Band-Aid the symptoms.

In addition to the Pet Smart grant, Dawnette has been hard at work finding and applying for other grants for the shelter.
